SSV AUSTRALIAN FOOTBALL - PRIMARY FAQs





Why has SSV changed its Australian Football offering toward Primary students?

In partnership with AFL Victoria, School Sport Victoria is making Australian Football as accessible as possible through modified rules. This is consistent with SSV's strategic plan to align competition rules with State Sporting Organisations. The changes are designed to provide a better student experience for all participants, including seeing more touches of the ball, more goals, and players constantly involved in the game. It also enables more students and schools, including multiple teams from schools, to experience SSV primary school Australian Football.

The change in format was discussed with the SSV community through coordinator region forums in 2023 and then considered by the SSV Executive Team before the new rules were approved. Trial Region competitions were conducted in 2023 and 2024 by AFL Victoria with a State Finals event held in November of that year. Research was also undertaken by ACHPER Victoria to assess the suitability of the new approach.

I am a sports coordinator and/or SSV coordinator and am unsure how to get started. Where do I find out all relevant information?

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What are the dates for the SSV Australian Football - State Primary Championships in 2025? As they are updated these can be found here: <u>School Sport Victoria - Sport - Australian</u> Football.

How many teams progress from District, to Division, to Region, to State in 2025? In 2025, one boys/mixed team and one girls team will progress from each District to Division, from each Division to Region and each Region to State.

How many teams can a school enter into the SSV competition pathway (District onwards?)

Schools should contact their district coordinator to see team entry limits. To find out who your district coordinator is, look up your school on our <u>school database</u>.

Can AFL Victoria help me with the delivery of District/Division/Region? Is there support available to assist me in running a Primary Australian Football Competition at School, District, Division or Region level of competition?

AFL Victoria will be available to support Coordinators and Teachers in the lead up to competitions to support in the understanding and education of the new format and any changes. This includes but is not limited to:

- Providing PD sessions on rule modifications and umpiring (both online and in person)
- · Supporting with optimal field set up based on number of schools participating
- Guidance on any fixturing support to maximise the day
- Any additional support can be discussed with your AFL Victoria region staff member

AFL Victoria staff can be contacted at any time in the lead up and during to help provide guidance and support in ensuring that SSV District/Division/Region coordinators can effectively deliver their competitions. This support extends to any primary schools that may need any further education on any of the above.

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In addition to this, you can reach out to SSV's Region School Sport Officers for further advice.

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Can I still play the 18v18 format?

There is no SSV competition pathway for the 18v18 format from 2025. Schools may play 'friendly matches of the 18v18 format, but this is not endorsed or supported by SSV.

I'm a District/Division/Region Coordinator. Will I get any equipment to run these competitions?

AFL Victoria is providing the following equipment to the SSV community including:

- SSV Districts receive 1 goal post set
- SSV Divisions receive 4 kits
- SSV Regions receive 4 kits
- **SSV State** receives 4 kits

The equipment will be distributed in the coming weeks with the goal post set (including a bag) and the kits consisting of the 2 * size 3 footballs, 1 goal post set (including bag), and cones.

To run a match 8 agility poles, 50 cones, 8 flat ground markers, and 2 Size 3 synthetic footballs are required.

Additional equipment can be purchased on the AFL Play Store.

How can my school manage multiple teams at District level?

If submitting multiple teams at District level, schools should determine adequate staffing for groups of students as per the <u>Department of Education Excursion Policy</u>. If submitting multiple teams at District level, schools should determine adequate staffing for groups of students as per the <u>department Excursion Policy</u>.

This could include school principal endorsed parents, coaches and education support staff that accompany a VIT-registered teacher. Districts should make necessary arrangements to promote maximum participation (i.e. draws can be devised to ensure that teams from the same school are not drawn to play at the same time). For example: If a school has two teams, a minimum of two adults are required to provide duty of care. Sometimes a school may need to provide an umpire, so one adult can supervise the two teams, as long as both are not playing at the same time, or the school can bring a third adult or suitable student to undertake the school's rostered umpiring duties.

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
